## INTRODUCTION

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### Supporting policy dialogues & strengthening cooperation with Africa

EuroAfrica-ICT is a EU/FP7 project that spans 24 months (2010-2011) and aims to support policy dialogues and strengthen cooperation on ICT research between Europe & Africa.

The EuroAfrica-ICT project is defined in full continuity with and builds upon the substantial results obtained and the significant momentum created by two previous initiatives: the FP6/IST START project (2006-2008) and the FP7/ICT EuroAfriCa-ICT project (2008-2009) - both coordinated by Sigma Orionis.

The EuroAfrica-ICT initiative which has been developing since 2005 through these two projects and which is supported by a high number of key stakeholders in the field both in Europe and in Africa, has established close synergies with most national and international programmes and initiatives; has already identified policy and research priorities to support the development of policy dialogues and has provided the European and African research communities with continuous and reliable support and guidance.

EuroAfrica-ICT has the strategic objective to promote and enhance ICT research cooperation between the two continents thanks to, among other things, **the organization of "Euro-Africa Cooperation Forums on ICT Research"**: conferences filled with discussions and debates, networking opportunities and knowledge-sharing among key stakeholders in the field and policymakers coming from all over Europe and Africa. As an international project, EuroAfrica-ICT also seeks to raise awareness on FP7/ICT cooperation opportunities between the two continents.

### How to get there

#### From Cape Town International Airport | Total distance: 25 km

By car, shuttle or taxi:

- The CTICC have a preferred supplier they use for transfers - cost per person is ZAR200 one way.
- Delegates may also use a shuttle if they travel together. The cost will be ZAR320 for the first person and ZAR50 additional per person sharing.
- Delegates also have the option **of taking the meter taxi's at the airport if they don't want to pre book. The taxi's will charge** between ZAR13 – ZAR18 per km. Thus, between ZAR325 – ZAR450 per transfer.
- Should delegates wish to pre-book their transfer, they may contact the Hotel Services Manager at the CTICC by email. The manager will send you the transfer booking form and book the transfers for you.

The directions from the airport to the Cape Town International Convention Centre or City Centre are as follows:





**From the N2 Highway / M3 from the Southern Suburbs:** Follow the Stad / City signage and once on Eastern Boulevard, move into the lane with M6 / Sea Point / V&A Waterfront sign. You will drive past the Cape Town International Convention Centre on your left. Keep in the left hand lane and at the traffic lights, turn left into Coen Steytler. Drive along Coen Steytler till you reach the Heerengracht Circle. Turn left into the Heerengracht and just after the next set of traffic lights, the entrance to the site is on your left.

**From the N1 Highway:** Follow the Stad / City signage which will lead you into the city and onto Eastern Boulevard. You will drive past the Cape Town International Convention Centre on your left. Keep in the left hand lane and at the traffic lights, turn left into Coen Steytler. Drive along Coen Steytler till you reach the Heerengracht Circle. Turn left into the Heerengracht and just after the next set of traffic lights the entrance to the site is on your left.

**From Atlantic Seaboard:** From Main Road Sea Point, go all the way along, passing the Waterfront on your left, and going into Main Road Green Point. Keep going on the Main Road Green Point until you reach Somerset Road in Green Point. Follow Somerset Road and turn left into Buitengracht Road. Go along Buitengracht Road and turn right into Coen Steytler Road. Drive along Coen Steytler till you reach the Heerengracht Circle. Turn left into the Heerengracht and just after the next set of traffic lights the entrance to the site is on your left.

## VISA INFORMATION

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### Requirement for entering South Africa

Requirements for entry into South Africa differ from country to country, and are subject to change. The requirements to obtain a visa to South Africa are listed [here](#). Generally, you'll need the following:

- A valid acceptable passport or travel document good for a sufficient period to cover your intended stay
- A valid visa, if required
- Sufficient funds
- A return or onward ticket
- At least two blank pages in your passport
- Yellow fever certificates are required if the journey starts or entails passing through the yellow fever belt of Africa or South America

### Do I need a visa to visit South Africa?

Depending on your nationality, and the purpose and duration of your visit, you may not need a visa to visit South Africa: check the list of exemptions [here](#).

If you need a visa, the event organizers can expedite the process by sending you an invitation letter. ## **P**ERSONAL SECURITY AND SAFETY OF PARTICIPANTS

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Personal security is an individual responsibility. Using common sense and being alert can reduce risks.

The aim of this section is to provide conference participants with the necessary advice to avoid risks and to ensure the safety of valuables and personal security.

During your stay at the conference venue, the following advice should be observed:

- Wear your meeting badge visibly and display it on demand to an authorized person;
- Do not bring unauthorized persons and children into the conference centre;
- Safeguard your valuable property; and
- Check you have all your documents and personal items before you leave conference halls and meeting rooms.

In the hotel:

- Upon entering or leaving your room, make it a habit to lock the door;
- Before leaving, inspect your room to make sure no money, jewellery, cameras, etc. have been left exposed;
- Deposit valuables or portable items at the reception desk and obtain a receipt.





# HEALTHCARE

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## Hospitals and medical care

There is a large network of public and private hospitals across South Africa. It is best to avoid public hospitals where possible. Private hospitals (such as the Netcare Group) are of world class standard. Private hospital treatment in large cities is generally excellent but can be expensive. Medical facilities in rural areas can be basic. In remote areas, air evacuation is sometimes the only option for medical emergencies. English is commonly spoken by South African medical personnel.

The public hospital system and many private hospitals honour foreign credit cards. Most pharmacies are open during normal shopping hours and major cities have at least one 24-hour service pharmacy.

A tourist or temporary visitor to South Africa requiring immediate emergency medical assistance may visit a local medical centre or clinic. Usually these stations are located at hospitals and provide a full range of services. An appointment is usually expected, although it is possible to see a nurse immediately. In an emergency, all foreigners may turn to the nearest health centre or hospital emergency unit.

## Health Insurance and Medical Assistance

We strongly recommend that you obtain comprehensive health insurance before travelling to South Africa, including cover for medical evacuation.

There are a number of independent emergency assist companies in South Africa. The general emergency number from mobile phones is 112 and free of charge.

## Malaria

The north-eastern areas of the country (including the Kruger National Park, St. Lucia and





surrounding areas) are seasonal malaria zones, from about November to May. The peak danger time is just after the wet season from March to May. Consult a physician regarding appropriate precautions, depending on the time of year you will be travelling.

Delegates are advised to take a malaria prophylaxis, even though the conference is not in a Malaria endemic area.

We suggest the following: MALANIL® containing Atovaquone - 250mg tablets. Starting 2 days prior to your trip and continuing for at least a week after returning home.

The most important defences against malaria are:

- Using a DEET-based mosquito repellent
- Covering your skin with long-sleeved clothing, especially around dusk
- Using mosquito nets while sleeping (in malaria zones only, not Cape Town)
- Tabbard and Peacefull Sleep are commonly used mosquito repellents and can be bought almost anywhere.

## **Water**

Municipal tap water is usually safe to drink throughout the country. However, bottled water is available. In the Cape, the water contains humic acid, which stains it the colour of diluted Coca-Cola - this is absolutely harmless, and the water is good. You may also find this colouring in tap water in some areas.

## **Sunburn**

Many activities in South Africa are outdoors.

Sunglasses with UV protection are a must in bright sunlight, and especially in areas where the surroundings reflect sunlight, such as beaches, on water and in deserts.

Clothing is by far the most effective defence against the sun, but not all clothing is UV resistant, and you can get burnt even while wearing some clothing. Make sure you bring a hat and protective clothing should you plan a visit to the beach or tourist destinations after the Forum.

## **Sun Lotion**

Applying sun lotion is better than nothing, but bear in mind that even the highest factor sun lotions only provide partial UV-protection, and none are suitable for prolonged (2 hours+) exposure to strong sunlight. Sun lotion should only be used as a last resort where clothing isn't possible or practicable or while you are in the water and they need to be reapplied at least every 2 hours.

## **HIV and AIDS**





As in other countries, always take precautions. South Africa has one of the largest HIV infection rates world-wide. 5.4 million people out of a population of 48 million are HIV-positive (*South African Medical Research Council*).

### **Smoking**

Smoking is banned in all enclosed public spaces, including airports, pubs, shopping malls and theatres. Most restaurants do have smoking sections, either ventilated indoor areas or outdoor open areas.





## **M**OBILE PHONE AND LANDLINE SERVICES

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### **Landline services**

South Africa's country code is 27.

Phone numbers within South Africa are of the format OXX YYY ZZZZ.

Large cities have area codes OXX (Johannesburg is 011, Pretoria 012, Cape Town 021, Durban 031, Port Elizabeth 041, East London 043, Kimberley 053, Bloemfontein 051) while smaller towns may have longer area codes (OXX Y for example) with shorter local numbers.

When dialling a South African number from outside the country, one should dial +27 XX YYY ZZZZ.

Dialling within the country one should use all 10 digits, OXX YYY ZZZZ.

To dial out of South Africa, dial 00 followed by the country code and the rest of the number you are trying to reach.

## CURRENCY AND BANKS

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The currency in South Africa is the Rand (R), internationally known as the ZAR. It is divided into 100 cents. Coins come in denominations of 5c, 10c, 20c, 50c, R1, R2 and R5, and notes in denominations of R10, R20, R50, R100 and R200.

The exchange rate with the Euro is 1 EUR = 9,7 ZAR.

With a favourable exchange rate for many international currencies, you'll find South Africa a very inexpensive destination. The financial institutions are world-class, with no shortage of banks, bureaux de change and automatic tellers.

### **How far will my money go?**

A long, long way. With a favourable exchange rate for the major international currencies, you'll find South Africa a very inexpensive destination.

You will also find South Africa an easy destination. From the moment you step off the plane you'll start seeing banks, bureaux de change and automatic tellers all around.

The banks are generally open from 9am to 3.30pm Mondays through Fridays, and 8.30am to 11am on Saturdays, but those at the airports adjust their hours to accommodate international flights.

The major banks have branches as well as automated teller machines (ATMs) in most large towns – and all around the cities. International banks have branches in the major cities. Thomas Cook (represented by Rennie's Travel) and American Express foreign exchange offices are also available in the major cities. [Exchange rates](#).

Traveller's cheques are a safe way of carrying money. You can exchange them at all banks (which are found throughout the country even in rural areas) and you will get a refund if they are stolen. The disadvantage is that you cannot pay with them and you will need change when exchanging them into Rand. Use ATMs instead if possible.

Automated Teller Machines (ATMs), linked to all major international networks, are available throughout the country and will generally dispense money in a mixture of denominations between R200 and R10, with about 80% of the value requested being high value notes and the rest in smaller denominations. You can use any Cirrus or Maestro card as well as all major credit and debit cards at the ATMs.

It is best to use only ATMs that are inside a mall or other building. Always be careful to make sure no one is watching you enter your PIN, and be vigilant about scams (e.g. machines that seem to eat your card and won't give it back after you enter the PIN). Do not accept help from strangers when withdrawing money at an ATM. If you are approached and offered unwanted help, rather cancel the





transaction immediately and go to a different ATM. The till points at some major retail stores (*such as Pick 'n Pay*) also act as ATMs; simply tell the checkout clerk that you would like to withdraw money.

### **Credit cards and cash**

All major credit cards can be used in South Africa, with American Express and Diners Club enjoying less universal acceptance than MasterCard and Visa. In some small towns, you may find you'll need to use cash. Most retail stores accept credit cards and pin based debit cards as payment.

### **Petrol (fuel)**

When it comes to paying for fuel, you may pay cash or by credit card.

Road tolls, on the major routes between cities, can be paid using MasterCard or Visa.

### **VAT**

(Value Added Tax) is levied at 14% on almost all products in South Africa. By law, advertised prices should be inclusive of VAT except when explicitly stated otherwise. Foreign passport holders may claim back the VAT on products that were bought in South Africa and are being taken out of the country, provided that the total value of the goods exceeds R250. Full details of the procedure to follow are available from the Department of Foreign Affairs and their new TAX Refund for tourists site. VAT Refund Administrator's offices are available at both Johannesburg (O.R. Tambo) and Cape Town International Airports.

## ABOUT CAPE TOWN

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Cape Town, Mother City of Africa, and the Western Cape, a part of an area which is regarded as one of the most beautiful regions in the world. The city is a rare cultural gem, resulting from the amalgamation of Indonesian, French, Dutch, British and German settlers, and local tribes from the north.

It is the provincial capital and primate city of the Western Cape, as well as the legislative capital of South Africa, where the National Parliament and many government offices are located. The city is famous for its harbour and natural setting which help make the city, Africa's most popular tourist destination.

The impressive presence of Table Mountain, flanked by the legendary Devil's Peak and historical Signal Hill, stands proudly above the city. Beautiful white sandy beaches along a peaceful coastline frame the Cape Peninsula, which is famed for its unique flora, bountiful rivers, valleys, dams and magnificent countryside. The surrounding area extends far into the wine-lands, green in summer and red-gold in autumn.

Cape Town boasts a multitude of entertainment, ranging from outdoor activities and adventures in the sun to a roaring night life under neon signs. The vast range of shopping opportunities includes haggling with shopholders at Greenmarket Square Flea Market, as well as breezing through sophisticated and stylish shopping malls. The huge variety of Cape Town restaurants reflects the multicultural history of the Cape and caters for everyone's taste, from fast-food outlets and casual to the chic and elegant

Cape Town provides a setting for many scenic wonders, magnificent seascapes and panoramic vistas. The beautiful coastal areas of Camps Bay, Clifton, Llandudno, Bantry Bay, Hout Bay and Blouberg surround the breathtaking tranquility of the winelands, Constantia, Stellenbosch, Paarl and Franschoek.

Cape Town is a city of culture, built on a history that reflects in the architecture, cuisine, music and dance. Together with a warm summer, temperate winter climate and a friendly community, the Western Cape and the Mother City are an ideal holiday destination throughout the year.

South Africa has eleven official languages. However, English is widely understood and spoken.

### Climate

The Cape Peninsula has a Subtropical Mediterranean climate with wild, wet winters and dry and very warm summers. The winter months are cool, with an average minimum of 7.0°C and maximum of **17.5°C. Most of the city's annual rainfall occurs in wintertime.** Summer, which lasts from November to March, is warm and dry. The Peninsula gets frequent strong winds from the south-east, known locally as the Cape Doctor, because it blows away pollution and cleans the air. Summer





temperatures are mild, with an average maximum of 26.5 °C. Cape Town can be uncomfortably hot when the Berg Wind, meaning "mountain wind" blows from the Karoo interior for a couple of weeks in February or early March.
